

## A NEW ZEALAND-WIDE SERIES OF TEMPORARY PUBLIC ARTWORKS

# Media Release – for immediate release Friday 24<sup>th</sup> October 2008







One Day Sculpture is not an exhibition. Conceived as a cumulative series of newly commissioned one-day public artworks across New Zealand over one year, the series features 27 artists from 18 countries, including Thomas Hirschhorn, Roman Ondák, Javier Tellez, Michael Parekowhai, Lara Almárcegui, Paola Pivi and Rirkrit Tiravanija. UK-based Curatorial Director Claire Doherty, with the Litmus Research Initiative at Massey University, is working with 16 curators across five regions of New Zealand to realise the series, which was launched in August 2008 and runs until June 2009.

One Day Sculpture was conceived within a contemporary art landscape dominated by large-scale international biennial exhibitions. The continued exponential growth of these events has given rise to a surge in place-based art commissioning. Responding to the increasingly performative, event-based and dispersed forms of contemporary art, Claire Doherty sought to harness the energies of the one-off event or festival, but within a longer-term cumulative and collaborative project.

"One Day Sculpture sets out to challenge conventional curatorial formats," Doherty suggests, "which customarily set newly commissioned works within the framework of a six-week thematic exhibition bound to a particular (often urban) location. This project asks a range of visiting and resident artists to each produce a project for a single day in the public realm in one of five regions in New Zealand. New Zealand has historically been associated with being at 'the end of the world', but with each 24-hour project occurring in the first time zone to see a new day, the series positions the locations of New Zealand at the centre rather than the periphery of first-hand experience of new artworks.

Whilst One Day Sculpture seeks to inspire new definitions of public sculpture, it does so as a series of fleeting interventions which, one after the other, then circulate beyond New Zealand entering the social imagination as documents, fictions and rumors."

By December 2008, eight projects will have occurred including dystopian warnings of the climatic future of the city of Wellington (Ivan and Heather Morison and Amy Howden-Chapman), a subtle, but radical shift in Auckland's consumerist economy (Superflex), a soup-kitchen commemorating a grisly murder (Kah Bee Chow), a literary gathering in a small-town Kentucky Fried Chicken outlet (Liz Allan) and a pilgrimage out to a refurbished boat-shed in anticipation of a force 9 gale about hit Wellington's harbour (Maddie Leach).

2009 will see another 13 projects by artists including **Paola Pivi**, known for her creation of unexpected and fantastical situations such as One Cup of Cappuccino, Then I Go (2007), which featured a performance with a leopard walking across 3,000 cappuccino cups; **Roman Ondák**, who is gaining an international reputation for his subtle performative interventions and re-imaginings of public space; **Thomas Hirschhorn**, whose hypersaturated assemblages commonly employ foil, tape, board, plastic, paper, and other found and ephemeral materials and **Bik van der Pol**, who activate situations and create platforms for various kinds of communicative activities such as their *Nomads and Residents* project conducted from 2000-07. One Day Sculpture: an international symposium on art, place and time will take place from 26-28 March 2009, bringing together leading international curators, cultural theorists and historians, participating artists, writers and curators to address the principal ideas and contexts that have informed the development of the series. Speakers will include Bik van der Pol, Thomas Hirschhorn, Maria Lind, Paola Pivi, Professor Jane Rendell, Javier Tellez and Jan Verwoert. Registration commences via the One Day Sculpture website from 15 December 2008.

**The One Day Sculpture book**, co-edited by Dr. David Cross and Claire Doherty will set the documentation of all 21 projects within the broader international art context as well as the related fields of art history, cultural geography and contemporary art theory. The book will be published by Kerber Verlag in late 2009.
